Tech Tip

Tech Tip: Document comparison in Microsoft Word

What is it? It is a way to compare two substantially similar documents to find differences.


Why use it? Use it when there is a need to either compare updates or changes from another party or in estate planning, to compare the documents for two spouses. Think of it as a way to zero in on the needles in a haystack.

How can this be done?


First, you should have very similar documents, as in wills or trusts for spouses or purchase agreements that buyer and seller are exchanging. Dissimilar documents can still be compared, but the differences will be so significant that you will still be looking for needles in a haystack.

Note: this example was used with Microsoft Word for Mac, version 16.11.1 (essentially Office 365). Windows users will have the same functionality, although the menu paths may appear slightly different.

First, in Word, go to Tools > Track Changes > Compare Documents....




Next, locate one of the documents to compare from the "Original document" menu, then do select the other document to compare from the "Revised document" menu.



While on this menu, also select how you want the comparison to appear. Your choices are "Original document," "Revised document" or "New document." It is your call how you want to see the changes. Remember that if you see them in one of the "living" versions documents, you do run the risk of writing over that version if you start accepting or rejecting changes. Once you have selected how the comparison will appear, click OK.

Finally, the comparison will then be displayed, showing the additions and deletions between the two documents. When preparing the sample versions I deliberately mixed up the pronouns, left in brackets, and deleted language in one version but not the other. These are displayed as additions or deletions, highlighted accordingly.
